

The Anthropocene Golden Spike: The Age of Humans

Oral Presentation

Use the information gathered from the reading and writing assignments to build a PowerPoint presentation. All PowerPoint presentations must use subtle animations and the Assertion-Evidence structure (<https://www.assertion-evidence.com>).

Preparing the presentation

- The presentation should be ten minutes long.
- The presentation must have the following types of slides: one title page slide, one thesis statement slide, enough appropriately animated assertion-evidence format slides to support the thesis, one closing statement slide, and one reference slide.
- Do not use slide titles—use assertion statements.
- Use the cropping tool for images.
- Use a white box to overwrite extraneous material on figures.
- Use a large font (28 to 36 point).
- Avoid bullets.
- Avoid dark backgrounds.
- Follow the referencing guidelines (and use hanging indents).
- Adjust text boxes to fit the text to the space.

Giving the presentation

- Read all text on all slides.
- After reading the thesis be sure to explain to the audience why the topic is important and why they should pay attention to your presentation. In other words, explain why this presentation is important and valuable.
- The closing statement slide should explain to the audience what you want us to do with the new information.

Assessing the presentation

- Submit a copy of your presentation, via Canvas, by 10:00 am on 21 April 2020.

Content	emotional; lacks data; vague	technically accurate; quantitative; terms used appropriately	25

Conclusion slide	new ideas presented	take-home message is clearly stated	5
